## *The Space Between: Anita Fields & Molly Murphy Adams* On view: October 1 through November 21, 2021

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Tulsa, OK - Since 2013, 108 Contemporary has provided exhibition space in the Tulsa Arts District for the most innovative contemporary craft from Oklahoma and around the world, exposing Oklahomans to the world of fine craft and raising the visibility of Oklahoma artists. This fall, the non-profit gallery presents the exhibition *The Space Between: Anita Fields & Molly Murphy Adams* (October 1 through November 21, 2021). The exhibition uses concepts of culture, pattern, color, and rich craft traditions explored using contemporary methods merged with deep personal meaning to form a survey of each artists' work.

Anita Fields (Osage) and Molly Murphy Adams (Oglala Lakota), are both Oklahoma-based, Native women. Their work intersects in terms of its Native perspective and its exploration of traditional Native American regalia.

Fields is an Osage artist recognized for her ceramic sculptures and fiber techniques in her Native regalia-inspired artwork. The basic tenets of her Osage culture influence and inform her ideas, saying, "I use our beliefs and worldview as metaphors in my work while documenting the evolution of our culture through the creation of ceramic figures, landscapes, and fiber-based forms." Murphy Adams, who is of Oglala Lakota descent, bases her work on concepts of hybridization—pairing the needlework techniques of beadwork and embroidery with printmaking and paper media. Murphy Adams' work illustrates the blending of cultures, identities, and histories by juxtaposing dissimilar methods, media, and narratives. Fields and Murphy Adams both utilize techniques passed down from their Native elders in innovative ways to address contemporary issues. In her clay and textile works, Fields creates narratives that ask viewers to consider other ways of seeing and being in an effort to understand our shared existence in the world. Her work also speaks to environmental issues by referencing the Osage notions of duality, such as earth and sky. Murphy Adams uses traditional beading techniques—learned while growing up on the Salish Kootenai Reservation in Montana—in nontraditional ways "to articulate new observations on politics, history, and identity."
