- Sewing





FiberWorks is a special exhibition because it is supposed to represent both traditional and innovative work by fiber artists of all kinds. This led to a wide variety of applications, so the Fiber Artists of Oklahoma hired a juror to choose which fiber art should be included in the gallery.

About Fiberworks

This exhibition features 45 objects by 39 different artists! A juror, artist Jane Dunnewold, selected the works from dozens of submissions. We call her process "blind selection" because she didn't know which artist made which piece. She only had a photo of the artwork and a short statement about the piece in order to judge it.



Macramé

Let's explore some fiber art that isn't represented in the exhibition: macrame!

Macrame is the practice of tying knots in several strands of rope, yarn, or cord. You'll learn three different macrame knots that you can use to make an original wall hanging.


Preparation and Knots

Prepare Your Macrame

- 1. Place your dowel in a comfortable position
- 2. Tape your dowel down to a surface
- 3. When making your macrame tapestry, taping or setting aside strings that aren't in use may help keep your project neat

Reverse Lark's Head Knot

- 1. Fold your yarn in half
- 2. Place the folded part over the dowel, and bring the ends of the yarn into the fold
- 3. Tighten until your knot is firm
- 4. Repeat until you have all your yarn placed onto the dowel




Double Half Hitch

1. Hold your anchor in the direction you want your half hitch knot to go


2. Knot your working string around the anchor

- 3. Repeat step 2
- 4. Tighten until knot is firm



Square Knots

- 1. Place the left working string over the anchor cords and under the right string
- 2. Take the right string and place it under the anchor cords and over the left cord
- 3. Tighten
- 4. Place the left string under the anchor and over the right string.
- 5. Take the right string and place it over the anchors and under the left string
- 6. Tighten
